

THE CURRICULUM POLICY

The curriculum comprises all the planned learning that Thamesmead School provides for its students. This includes delivering the National Curriculum, religious education, sex education and careers education. The school curriculum aims:

- to provide opportunities for all students to enjoy learning and to achieve;
- to promote students' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development and prepare all students for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of life, by enabling them to contribute to the community, to gain a sense of economic well-being and to understand how to remain healthy.
- to reflect the values and vision of the school
- to provide students with the care, guidance and support to achieve their potential.
- to actively promotes the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs.

Within the school curriculum, the National Curriculum secures for all students, irrespective of social background, culture, race, gender, differences in ability and disabilities, an entitlement to a number of areas of learning, and to develop knowledge, understanding, skills, mastery and attitudes necessary for their self-fulfilment and development as active and responsible citizens.

As an Academy we have the flexibility to adapt and extend the curriculum to ensure it best fits the needs of our students. At Thamesmead teachers have due regard to developing a more inclusive curriculum by setting suitable learning challenges; responding to students' diverse learning needs; and overcoming potential barriers to learning and assessment for individuals and groups of students.

Responsibility for the curriculum is shared between the Headteacher and the governing body.

At Key Stage 4 students study:

▪ **A core of compulsory subjects:** English, Mathematics, Science, Physical Education, and Religion, Philosophy and Ethics.

All students study English Language and English Literature as two GCSEs.

All students will study a Science course leading to two GCSEs in Science and many will opt to take Triple Science as an option and gain three Science GCSEs.

▪ **Compulsory areas of learning:** careers education, sex education and work-related learning are delivered through our Citizenship programme and through specific focus days

▪ **Option Subjects:** The Options Programme provides students with the opportunity to access a range of GCSE and vocational subjects:

- Students are able to select 3 option subjects.
- Students must study at least one EBacc subject from the following list – Computer Science, French, Geography, History, Spanish or Triple Science.
- GCSE courses – Art, Design and Technology, Drama, Food Preparation and Nutrition, Music, PE.
- Vocational courses – Business and Enterprise, Health and Social Care, Sport.

We recognise the English Baccalaureate measure of achievement will be important for some of our students and encourage them to take this into account when they select their option subjects for GCSE.

Students are given guidance in their choice of KS4 courses and every effort is made to accommodate students' wishes. However, due to timetabling restrictions their choices cannot be guaranteed.

In Key Stage 3 two hours of high quality PE and school sport a week is provided, and in Key Stage 4 one hour is provided for all students. This includes the National Curriculum requirement for Physical Education (PE) and extra-curricular activities. Competitive games activities are compulsory throughout Key Stage 3. Students are offered access to a wide range of extra-curricular PE and sporting activities after school.

Promoting spiritual, moral, social and cultural development; promoting personal, social and health education; and promoting racial and cultural diversity are all seen as an integral part of school life. Our policy is that these should be delivered primarily through the formal subject areas, through

assemblies and the tutorial system. Focus days may be arranged to supplement this provision in exciting and challenging ways.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

At KS3 the school follows the locally agreed syllabus, which reflects the fact that the religious traditions in Great Britain are in the main Christian, whilst taking account of the teaching and practices of the other principal religions represented in the UK. At KS4 the GCSE syllabus is followed.
