

## Year 11 Curriculum Newsletter Autumn Term 1

### English



An Inspector Calls revision, Language paper 2 revision: By now your children have covered all of the GCSE course content and year 11 is all about revision, interleaving, and practise questions. In the first half term we will carry out a 'cold read' of An Inspector Calls (reading it over three lessons back-to-back) to refresh students' memories. We will then be learning quotations, key methods used by the playwright, study the structure of the play and wider ideas around it, and of course have a go at a number of practise questions. After that we will walk students through Language Paper 2, remind students of the demands of each question, provide them with 'how to respond' resources for revision, and do a 'walking talking mock', where we take them through a full paper in preparation for their mocks.

**Assessments:** one in-class AIC response, ongoing feedback on Language responses, followed by the November mocks.

**How can parents help?** Please ensure your child completes all of their home learning, which will be revision-based, and brings their copy of An Inspector Calls to school with them. Helping your children create a revision timetable or clock for Y11 would also be hugely beneficial.

### Science



You will be continuing your studies of Biology, Chemistry and Physics this term. Lessons will focus on new learning of the paper 2 topics for each science discipline. Homework will be revision of paper 1 topics studied last year - that will be assessed in your first mock exams.

**How can parents help?** Ensure your child has correct equipment such as a pen, a pencil, ruler and their own scientific calculator. Students need to start bringing their revision guides to lessons towards the end of this term. These books are an invaluable resource for your child's revision.

### PE (Core)

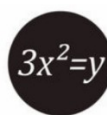


Students will receive a balance of activities with the goal of further developing their love for physical activity and their ability to perform with confidence

**Assessment :** Students are not formally assessed in core PE.

**How can parents help?:** Please ensure students complete home learning tasks on time and that they are organised with their full kit on PE days.

### Maths



**What are we doing this half term?** We will continue with the GCSE syllabus. **(Higher)** Graphs and inequalities, iterations, circle theorems. **(Foundation)** Fractions, indices & standard form followed by similarity & congruence and vectors.

**Assessments:** Students will complete a non-calculator paper towards the end of September.

**How can parents help?** Ensure your child has the correct equipment for every lesson such as a pencil, ruler, compass, protractor and most important - their own scientific calculator. Students are mostly set weekly individualised tasks based on needs - please encourage your child to complete them on Hegarty maths.

### History



Welcome to your final year at Thamesmead! Not long to go until the exams so organise your revision time table and go over the topics we have done over the past year. We will continue and complete our study into depth study into Germany in Transition (1919-1939) by investigating Nazi policy and it's effect on the German people. We will then move onto the final topic area - Elizabethan England (1558-1603).

**Assessment** - 3x Germany Assessments (dependent on where you got up to last year) and 2x Elizabeth tests. **How can parents help?** - Organised, dedicated and sustained revision time using class notes, revision notes and GCSE

### Computer Science



What are we doing this half term? Students will be learning all about cyber security, the ethical side of computer science and the laws involving computer science. Student will also be starting a guided programming project. This will enable students to practice their computational thinking skills and all of the programming techniques required to complete the paper 2 exam. Students will also be revising topics and theory learnt in year 10 in preparation for the first mock exam.

**Assessments:** Students will be given exam style questions each lesson to guide revision and help reflect on progress. These exam questions will be used to check the students are revising for the upcoming mock exams. **How can parents help?** Students need to spend 40 minutes a week practising their programming skills. Students also need to spend time revisiting the topics that were learnt about in year 10 and completing the home learning revision tasks that are set.

## Business & Enterprise

What are we doing this half term? Students will sit their Unit 1 exam in November - this is their actual exam and accounts for 40% of their final grade. In September and October students will be revising the Uni1 content. **Assessments:** Unit 1 exam in November. This will be a mixture of multiple choice, 2 mark and 4 mark questions and 6 mark and 9 mark extended response questions. For the extended response questions your child needs to be able to 1) recall the subject specific terminology 2) explain what this means / what the advantages and disadvantages are 3) link back to the context of the question/ explain what the impact would be. How can parents help? Ensure your child is revising for at least 20 mins a day. They will be assessed on all 5 learning outcomes in Unit 1. Please engage in your child's revision and ask them to explain key terms/ concepts/ advantages and disadvantages to you. If they can explain it it means they understand it. The BBC bitesize KS4 business pages are helpful with understanding key terms and key concepts. ## BTEC SPORT

Final year for Btec Sport - In the Autumn term students will be working on designing a fitness programme. Assessment: students will start their Unit 6 Aim A assignment on applying the Principles of Training. Additionally, they will continue developing their knowledge and understand of the theoretical content that will be assessed in their Unit 1 Exam. How can parents help: monitor progress of coursework towards the assignment brief. Please ensure students meet



## Religion, Philosophy and Ethics (RPE)

Year 11 will start with a conclusion to the Christian Practices module before swiftly moving on to learn about Religion and Life. Your son/daughter will be examined on Christian Practices within a few weeks of coming back after the summer holidays.

In the Religion and Life module we will be covering some challenging and controversial topics this term including abortion and euthanasia. Students will be required to discuss religious attitudes towards these topics as well as fully justify their own personal opinions.

Please talk about these topics at home and encourage healthy discussion. Students would do well to watch the news and research case studies from the UK and abroad.

## French



What are we doing this half term? Year 11 French begins with the topic of describing our home, and local and global issues related to the environment. ## Spanish

## Music



What are we doing this half term? Year 11 Music will start by looking at unfamiliar listening questions and revisiting Musical Forms and Devices, and Musical For Ensemble. Assessments: Formative teacher feedback of compositions and listening tasks in lessons. **How can parents help?** Please encourage your child to complete regular instrumental/singing practise and to listen to a variety of music! Support learning musical vocabulary.

## PE -GCSE



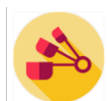
Final year for GCSE PE - In the Autumn term students will cover physical, emotional and social health fitness and well-being together with the consequences of a sedentary lifestyle. Revise and consolidate skills in isolation and game application for practical. Additionally, students will finished the content for Paper 1 topic Movement Analysis (2/3 lessons). **Assessment:** Students will complete a unit assessment after each theory topic. **How can parents help?** - Actively assist with their revision and continue to support their use of GCSE Pod and The EverLearner online resources.

## Drama



Year 11 will start the year completing the devising process which they worked hard on in year 10. Students will complete and make improvements to their Portfolio of Evidence (coursework) and will complete their Evaluation exam, (evaluating the success of their devised piece performed in year 10). The class will read and explore their set text 'Noughts and Crosses', and will develop their thinking as an actor, director and designer in relation to their set text. They will also watch a digital production from The National Theatre and prepare their evaluation response to it for their written exam. **Assessments:** Portfolio of Evidence coursework and Evaluation exam worth 30% of the GCSE.

## Food and Nutrition



The GCSE non-examination assessment (NEA 1) will begin this term and will consist of Food Investigation task, involving practical work and a written portfolio. The topic will be advised by the Exam board. They will apply their existing knowledge, skills and understanding of Food Science to produce a concise investigation. This together with the NEA2 will contribute to their final GCSE grade

**What parents can to help:** Experiment with dishes and food at home adapting and improving on recipes, practising their culinary skills. Encourage and schedule time for your child to read over their year 10 class notes regularly and memorise the key points and factual details. St up a revision timetable

## DT GCSE

What are we doing this half term? We will be looking at the Non Exam Assessment and continuing onto the initial design ideas and getting them to a high standard. We will also continue onto developing, modelling and assessing construction techniques for the final prototype. In theory sessions, the students will revisit the theory content that has the highest difficulty, in order to aid the recall in the exam. They will also practice a range of exam style questions. **Assessments:** The NEA is assessed throughout and the final outcome will form part of the final grade. We will also be using past papers to help assess student knowledge. **How can parents help?** Continue to be a good vocal client, checking in on their design work and giving constructive feedback. Take them to shops that sell similar products to their chosen design work and let them look at them to get an idea of how they are constructed.

## Art



Our GCSE Art & Design students begin Year 11 by developing their 'Identity' project into an 'Altered Portrait' project and exploring this concept in their own chosen direction. Coursework is worth 60% of a student's final GCSE grade. Students are assessed against the following objectives: AO1 Developing Ideas, AO2 Experiment & Refine, AO3 Recording Ideas, AO4 Present. These assessment objectives are equally weighted and students are graded holistically based on all the work they complete.

**How can parents help?** Please ensure that your child stays up-to-date with their coursework, our students are expected to be spending 3 -4 hours a week working on their art coursework at home outside our timetabled lessons. A space for students to work on their art coursework during evenings and weekends is an excellent way to support their progression. Students purchase a pack of materials at the beginning of the course but if parents are able to also purchase acrylic paints for students to also use at home, this would be a really supportive measure to ensure that coursework can be completed both at home and at school. If parents are also able to support students in visiting different museums and galleries and engaging in conversations about artworks, this is a great way to prepare them for and support them throughout the GCSE course.



**What are we doing this half term?** At the start of Y11 GCSE Geography students will look at different ways of classifying parts of the world according to their level of economic development and quality of life, such as, gross national income (GNI) per head, birth and death rates, infant mortality, life expectancy etc. They will study the link the Demographic Transition Model. The causes and consequences of uneven development and strategies used to reduce the development gap. Students will study Nigeria and look at the changing industrial structure, including the role of transnational corporations (TNCs) Including type of international aid and the effects on quality of life for the population.

**Assessments:** An end of topic written assessment, short and long answer questions, based on past GCSE exam questions. They will cover all of the assessment objectives. These skills will be continually practiced over the course of the GCSE. AO1: Demonstrate knowledge of locations AO2: Demonstrate geographical understanding of: concepts and the interrelationships between places. AO3: Interpret, analyse and evaluate geographical information and issues. AO4: Use a variety of skills to investigate questions and communicate findings.

**How can parents help?** Ensure your child has the correct equipment including, glue, scissors and a green pen for peer and self-assessment. Students have a revision help sheet for each new topic, and should be encouraged to complete Cornell revision notes at the end of each week's lessons, so they are producing them in manageable detailed chunks. Please assist students in keeping their human and physical revision books organised and with detailed notes and diagrams. Use GCSE Pod and Time for Geography to consolidate knowledge. Students should be revising work from Y10 and Y11 a minimum of once a week.
